Lesley Giroday (BC Region)

Lesley is a retired lawyer who practiced First Nations law in Vancouver for 17 years. For 15 years, Lesley was an active member of the North Shore Unitarian Church serving the youth program through mentoring and teaching OWL, sitting on the Board for seven years including a term as President, and chairing a ministerial search committee, among other things.



Lesley moved with her husband from Vancouver to Comox in September 2020. She is now a member of the Comox Valley Unitarian Fellowship and is working on another search committee presently.

Lesley has participated in community conservation initiatives for over 30 years. She enjoys outdoor activities and sports, and reading.


Maury Prevost (Central/Eastern Region)


